Welcome Guide

This document is a guide for newly joined MARC/WARG members welcoming you to the club. The club's official name is the Meriden Amateur Radio Club Inc.; however in 2015 the club adopted "Wallingford Amateur Radio Group" as a name to show synergy with the Town of Wallingford. In 2023 the club filed a Certificate of Trade Name with the Wallingford Town Clerk to formalize doing business as (d/b/a) the Wallingford Amateur Radio Group.

Official Club Website

Club Repeater

MARC/WARG operates a 2 meter FM Yaesu Fusion capable repeater, W1NRG on a frequency of 147.360, +0.6 MHz, PL 162.2. Users should configure the PL on both TX & RX to avoid hearing digital traffic on non-'Fusion' capable receivers.

The repeater is located on the water tank next to Gaylord Hospital in Wallingford and covers greater central CT. The repeater can also be accessed via "Echolink" node 624952.

Club members are encouraged to use the repeater. Please consider carrying your handheld with you whenever possible when you are out and about and putting your call sign out for a call on W1NRG/R.

Club Nets

There are several club nets held weekly. The nets are chat nets or ragchew nets (except for SKYWARN), as opposed to traffic nets, and open to all MARC/WARG members and licensed amateur radio operators. Technicians can operate on 6 and 10 meters SSB as well as 2 meters and are welcome on all of these nets. The club nets are:

Club Meetings, Grounds and Building (OEM)

Meetings

MARC/WARG holds two meetings each month.

Our monthly Business Meeting occurs on the second Thursday and an Activity/Tech Meeting is held on the fourth Thursday.

MARC/WARG officers hold office for one year and are elected during the November Business Meeting. The Club awards two individual awards - the Ham of the Year and the Elmer of the Year - and members vote for their selection for each award during the November Business Meeting. In December we host an annual Christmas Party and a Year in Review Meeting when award winners are announced and the club officers for the next year are introduced.

Business meetings start promptly at 7:00PM and are usually over by 8:00PM. Prior to each Business Meeting, the Community and Outreach Committee will send by email to all club members a Business Meeting package that contains:

- minutes from the prior month's business meeting,
- the meeting agenda,
- the Treasurer's report,
- the Secretary's report,
- the Station Manager's report, and,
- any supplemental documents relevant to the meeting.

Business meetings are chaired by the President, or Vice-President in their absence, and the club Secretary serves as Parliamentarian for the meeting. The Secretary verifies that a quorum is present.

The focus of business meetings shall be the conducting of official club business - that is, the movement, discussion and voting of motions.

When club business has been concluded, the president will move to adjourn the meeting. Upon adjournment, the Zoom room will remain open until 9:00 pm for members wishing to stay on for socializing, collaboration and discussion of non-business ham-radio related topics.

The OEM, MARC/WARG Club Headquarters

Every Saturday morning from 8:30 until noon we have a general open house for members and visitors to gather and exchange ideas or operate any of the four operating positions in the Chris Sievert Radio Room.

Saturday Open Houses are held at the Hope Hill Road Firehouse at 143 Hope Hill Road, Wallingford, CT 06492.

On the second Saturday of each month, the club holds a VE license exam testing session starting at 8:00 am. On these Saturdays, the Open House starts later, between 9:30 and 10:00 am.

Parking at the Firehouse (OEM)

The firehouse serves as the **Office of Emergency Management** for the town of Wallingford. It is used not only by MARC/WARG but also the Office of Emergency Management, Fire Department, the Medical Reserve Corp and the Health Department.

When attending meetings or events at the OEM, parking is allowed next to the building and at Moran Middle School which is next to the OEM. **Do not park in front of the garage doors.**

OEM House Keeping

The OEM is a building shared by several Wallingford Emergency Management organizations. Members using the OEM should respect the cleanliness of the building. The club membership is a tenant of this building and as such each member must keep the facility clean. Please don't leave coffee cups or water bottles behind. Food and liquids are not allowed in the radio room. All food should be discarded or taken home. At the end of each event, the kitchen and radio room garbage must be put in the dumpster outside by the small wooden building.

If you bring things to share on Saturday please make sure to take them with you after the session. Nothing should be left behind. If you wish to donate equipment, see the Station Activities Manager.

OEM Access

Deputy Emergency Management Director for the town of Wallingford, Leonard H. Guercia Jr, oversees the operation of the OEM.

Currently in 2025 all MARC club officers have access to the building and the radio room (shack). CERT members also have access to the building.

Social Websites

Our **Facebook** group page located at <https://www.facebook.com/groups/205532110841133> is an official MARC/WARG place to find posts of club activity, contesting and general Amateur Radio posts. This is a Members only group and you are encouraged to Opt-In.

Club members are encouraged to frequently refer to the Facebook page to learn of upcoming club events and are also encouraged to post ham-radio items of interest - such as projects they are working on, on-air activations they are planning, contest participation, and on-air achievements such as notable DX contacts made, etc. on our Facebook page. Members are discouraged from posting non-radio related items and from reposting general ham radio news from other sources.

There is an unofficial, less formal email reflector on Groups .io. <https://groups.io/g/MeridenARC>, used for club chit chat and informal conversations.

There is also a **Discord channel**, with several topics for sharing pictures and information. **Discord** also allows for text chat, video chat, and audio chat. Here is an invitation to the club's Discord channel <https://discord.gg/9UDHgv7g>

EMCOMM/AuxCom

MARC is closely linked with the Wallingford CERT organization. The Hope Hill Road Firehouse is home to both the Wallingford CERT and MARC/WARG. MARC/WARG has use of the facility for our club meetings and radio events. MARC/WARG currently has a permanent radio shack room whose primary use is EMMCOMM and secondary use as the MARC 'shack' for contesting and general communications by members. Folks with additional interest in EMMCOMM are encouraged to join the ARES Region 2, or take the CERT course and join the CERT team.

WARG (Wallingford Amateur Radio Group) provides staffing, logistics, and communications to the town through CERT. CERT has been activated to provide shelter for disaster victims at the OEM. We also receive training, and support the Wallingford Health Dept. in their emergency needs. Emergency Management, CERT, and DPH work as a team. We also work several public events throughout the year, 5K races, bicycle races and town events such as parades and celebrations.

Chris Sievert Memorial Club Radio Station

The club radio room is named in memory of the long time beloved member Chris Sievert WA1VXH (SK). The MARC/WARG Station Activities Manager (SAM) is the **Trustee** of the **Memorial Club Callsign, W1NRG** and maintains the club's Chris Sievert Radio Room at the Hope Hill Firehouse.

There are four operating positions available for use by club members and visitors. The HF phone station is served by a Yaesu FT-950 while the CW station uses a Yaesu FT991A. Both have access to multiple antennas to operate on all HF bands. The 6 meter position utilizes another Yaesu FT-991A connected to a beam antenna. The fourth position is for 2 meters using a Kenwood TM-V71. Dunestar Bandpass filters and external tuners are installed at each position as needed. The SAM maintains an additional variety of equipment including additional transceivers, tuners, filters, amplifiers, antenna analyzers, and antennas.

Contesting

MARC is active with several contesting and amateur radio events during the year. Notably the ARRL Field Day (last weekend in June), ARRL November Sweepstakes (CW and SSB), and The ARRL 10 Meter QSO Party are some events the club typically works as a club. The SAM or a group committee typically works up a list of volunteers that will operate shifts. Both SSB and CW modes are supported and operated based on interest level. Club members are urged to participate in these events, typical schedule times vary by contest but a typical "shift" is for two hours. Contesting as a club is a great way to learn DX'ing techniques.

Many members also belong to Ten-Ten International which sponsors 10 meter contesting events during the year. The Meriden Amateur Radio Club is the host of the Castle Craig Chapter of Ten-Ten International.

Several members participate in other notable on the air activities including POTA (Parks On The Air), SOTA (Summits On The Air) and the 13 Colonies Special Event in July.

Licensing testing and training

MARC/WARG holds ARRL VEC VE Exam sessions for Amateur Radio licensing on the second Saturday of each month at the OEM. Jim, N1ZN coordinates all club VE Sessions.

In 2023 MARC/WARG initiated collaboration with the Town of Wallingford Adult Education Program to offer a Technician License Class for the local community each fall. The course runs for ten weeks and is held on a weeknight at the OEM and is taught by a group of rotating club members each week. During the following spring semester, MARC/WARG offers an upgrade license class for licensed Technicians who wish to earn their General Class license. The format for the General Class is the same as the Technician Class. Both classes are advertised in the Wallingford AE Continuing Ed flier and website and on the ARRL License Class website.

For hams interested in learning CW we offer nightly CW classes on Zoom. Contact Bob Biancur, W1BGYZ to learn more.

MARC/WARG encourages all members to learn new modes or operating techniques through less formal learning opportunities during the Saturday open house.

Trustee, QSL Manager, Station Activity Manager

Rob Cichon, K1RCT is the club W1NRG licensee trustee and oversees all club equipment as Station Activities Manager. During contesting Rob ensures equipment is set up correctly.

As our club QSL manager, Bob Kaczor, KE1AU maintains a database for all QSLs. Bob also updates LoTW with our club on-air logs.

Yearly Events, Miscellaneous and Other

Membership dues are paid annually (January 1) to the Treasurer in cash, check or via PayPal, Venmo, or credit card using the link on our website. Any member 18 and under will be given free dues. Any member unpaid on April 1st will be removed from the Master Member List.

The Nutmeg Hamfest and ARRL Connecticut State Convention is closely aligned to MARC. The Nutfest is held each October and has a very good following of vendors and attendees. Members of MARC are encouraged to attend and volunteer at the event and to assist in making the event a success.

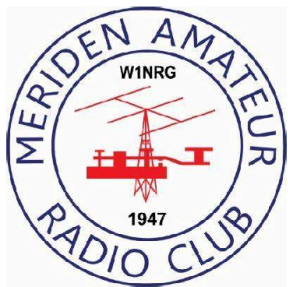
The MARC Christmas Party is held each December for members and their significant other. The Elmer of the Year and Ham of the Year awards are presented and the year's new officers are announced.

An annual scholarship is awarded by MARC/WARG to a local high school senior student from Meriden or Wallingford. Member's children and grandchildren are eligible even if not in the Wallingford or Meriden schools. Details of the Frank Darmofalski Scholarship can be found on the MARC website.

The annual MS walk in Cheshire is an event that MARC helps out with by providing communication during the event. MARC is always looking for volunteers to assist at this event held each May.

KeyKlix is a monthly news bulletin that includes event recaps, short stories, member interviews, tips, trivia, etc. Shawn – KC1NQE is the primary head of the KeyKlix committee, all members should receive this via email from the Outreach Committee monthly and it will be available on the club website.

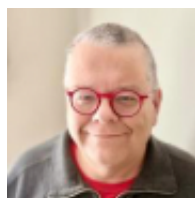


Treasurer – Rick Becker, KC1OYN

What the Heck is..... (Glossary of terms)

10-10 (Ten Ten International): An organization dedicated to encouraging use of the 10 meter band. **Castle Craig** is the local chapter of 10-10. <https://www.1010castlecraig.org/>

13 Colonies: An on-air special event activity in July each year enjoyed by many members.

Bug: A semi-automatic device for sending Morse code as compared to a traditional straight key.

Activities Table: Shows each week at a glance for most of the clubs' scheduled activities. Current activities table can be found at the end of this guide.

ARES: The **A**mateur **R**adio **E**mergency **S**ervice consists of Amateur Radio licensees who have voluntarily registered their qualifications and equipment for communications duty in the public service when disaster strikes.

ARRL (A Double R L): The **A**merican **R**adio **R**elay **L**eague. In conversation it may sound like "ARL"

Candy Store: A euphemism for the Gold Medal Ideas website where you can purchase jackets, hats, shirts and more with the club logo.

Castle Craig: *see 10 10 above.*

CERT: **CERT: Community Emergency Response Team.** See **EMCOMM/AuxCom** below for details.

Discord: An instant messaging and VoIP social platform which allows communication through voice calls, video calls, text messaging, and media and files.

Echolink: Software allows licensed Amateur Radio stations to communicate with one another over the internet, using streaming-audio technology. It is enabled on our repeater.

Egg Beater: A particular type of antenna used for working satellites, so named because it looks like a kitchen egg beater.

Elmer, Elmer's Shack, Elmer Net "Elmer" is the ham radio term for a mentor who personally guides and tutors a new ham, both before and after earning a license. In MARC we have an open Zoom meeting (net) on Sunday evenings which we call Elmer's Shack. Everyone licensed or not is invited to bring their ham radio questions to the shack to get answers.

EOC: A misnomer for the firehouse, **Office of Emergency Management** on Hope Hill Rd. where we meet and properly call the **OEM**. **Do not say EOC, please.**

Field Day, Winter Field Day, 13 Colonies, Sweeps and Sweepstakes: Names of several on the air activities that many club members enjoy.

FT8: A digital mode of communication that requires the use of a computer, a specialized software program, and a radio.

Fox hunt: A radio hobby activity where participants search for a hidden transmitter using various radio direction finding (**DF**) methods. Usually on but not limited to the 2 meter band.

Forum: Part of the W1NRG.COM website where registered club members can share/exchange information and content with other members.

Fox: Either (1) The hidden transmitter used in a Fox Hunt, or (2) one who hides the transmitter.

Fusion: Yaesu's proprietary digital voice mode that is available on the W1NRG/R repeater. If you don't have a Fusion capable receiver, then configure the 162.2 PL on both TX & RX to avoid hearing bursts of noise caused by digital transmissions.

Groups.io A email message board & email server popular with organizations and clubs such as the Meriden Amateur Radio Club.

In and Out: An expression used when someone checks into an on-air net and is recognized in the log of the net, but doesn't want to wait for a turn to contribute to the actual net. (ie I'm here and good bye)

IOTA: An acronym for **I**slands **O**n **T**he **A**ir, A structured on-air amateur radio program in which operators activate land masses surrounded by bodies of water.

KeyKlix: The name of the official MARC/WARG monthly newsletter.

Kerchunk: The practice of keying up a repeater without properly identifying your station. Usually done by poor operators just to see if they can reach the repeater. Please do not kerchunk the W1NRG/R repeater. Be courteous and state your call sign if you are testing to see if you can hit the machine.

Lid: Slang for a sloppy or unskilled amateur operator. *Ex: "Some lid keeps kerchunking the repeater!"*

LoTW: Logbook of the World An ARRL web based service for verifying DX contacts without needing to rely on the exchange of paper QSL awards. Used to confirm qualification for various ARRL awards such as Worked All States or DX Century Club.

MARC: Acronym for the **M**eriden **A**mateur **R**adio **C**lub, Incorporated..

MARCONI: Acronym for **M**otivating **A**mateur **R**adio **C**lubs to **O**pen **N**ew **I**nitiatives,, a MARC program funded by a grant from the ARRL and the Amateur Radio Digital Communications with the stated purpose of tutoring and/or reinvigorating struggling radio clubs that suffer from low activity or member disinterest.

Net An on-air activity where stations sharing an interest in a particular topic meet at a specified time on a specific frequency to discuss the topic of interest. A **Directed** or **Controlled net** has one designated **Net Control Station** that coordinates and keeps order during the net. In MARC we sometimes use 'Net' to refer to 'Zoom' meetings.

Nutmeg Hamfest Alliance: The name of the corporation that conducts the **Nutmeg Hamfest** and the ARRL Connecticut State Convention each October.

OEM: The **O**ffice of **E**mergency **M**anagement and the correct name of the firehouse on Hope Hill Rd where we meet. (See **EOC** above for further clarification.)

-OTA : An acronym suffix used to identify various popular on-air activities such as **POTA** (Parks on the Air), **SOTA** (Summits on the Air), **JOTA** (Jamboree on the Air), etc.

POTA, Parks On The Air: A phenomenally popular **-OTA** activity in which some hams "activate" recognized state or national parks worldwide and other hams "hunt" the park by successfully completing a QSO with the activating station. Very popular at MARC, both hunters and activators can earn several awards for recognized achievements in the program.

QRZ: Typically refers to qrz.com (*pronounced Cue- Arrrrr-Zed*) the leading amateur radio website listing almost every callsign in the world. QRZ.com offers many useful features including news, articles, an online flea market, product reviews, personal ham profile pages, a logbook, and awards. Sometimes it refers to the Q code for “Who is calling me?”

RACES: Acronym for **R**adio **A**mateur **C**ivil **E**mergency **S**ervice. FCC licensed amateur radio operators may choose to enroll in RACES in order to provide emergency communications supporting the state, county and local emergency management agencies. The operator registers their amateur radio license and their station with the appropriate emergency management official and may receive credentials according to the emergency management agency's policies.

SAM: Acronym for **S**tation **A**ctivity **M**anager sometimes simply stated as **S**tation **M**anager or colloquially as “**Rob**.”

Scholarship: The Frank Darmofalski (W1FD) Memorial Scholarship of \$1000 is awarded each year to a local school graduating student. Club members' children or grandchildren are eligible even if not in a local school.

Simplex: Operating point to point on the same frequency without using a repeater.

SOTA: Acronym for **S**ummits **O**n**T**he **A**ir: Much like **POTA** but the activator operates from a listed hill or mountaintop (summit).

Sweeps or Sweepstakes: An ARRL on-air contest held on two weekends each November - one weekend for CW and the other for Phone (SSB).

The Reflector : The defunct email list server that ‘reflected’ (more or less) incoming email to the club members personal email accounts.

The League: Abbreviated nickname for the **American Radio Relay League** (*see above*).

US Islands is an annual on the air event similar to **IOTA**.

VE : A licensed amateur radio operator who is certified as a **V**olunteer **E**xaminer to give license exams. *Ex: “Jim Savage is a VE, he likes to give amateur radio exams.”*

WARG: The **W**allingford **A**mateur **R**adio **G**roup is MARC's doing business as (d/b/a) name as registered with the town of Wallingford for doing business in Wallingford.

Winter Field Day: A communications exercise held the last full weekend in January, similar to **Field Day**, except it is not an ARRL event and generally has colder temperatures.
