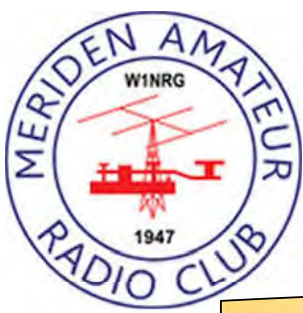

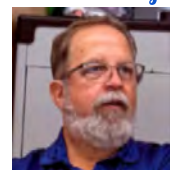

The President's Post **Field Day and POTA** *by Dave Tipping, NZ1J*

Two things we hear a lot about in ham radio are Field Day and POTA. ARRL tells us that Field Day is the most popular on-the-air event held annually in the US and Canada. And, POTA had 15 million QSOs logged in 2025. If you can think of a ham radio activity that is more popular than these two, let me know.

Jules, KC1STF, gave us a detailed report on MARC's 2026 Field Day effort in this month's Activity Meeting. There is general agreement that the addition of the farmland field increased participation and enthusiasm in 2026. What followed was a discussion of what more we can do in 2027. A lot of the discussion was about using better antennas. A decade or more ago, MARC put a lot of effort into Field Day antennas. There were towers and Yagis and a giant Vee Beam antenna. Now is as good a time as any to start thinking about antennas for next year.

There was also a discussion about operating more hours. At the OEM, we could do more with FT8 and more during the overnight hours. In the farmland field, with enough planning, we might also be able to operate overnight.

So, what about POTA? It has been said that POTA is "field day, every day." Skills acquired during POTA activations transfer very easily to Field Day. POTA activations usually go smoothly and can be a little bit addictive. They also can provide exposure to poor band conditions, fading, weak signals, pile-ups of several stations calling at once, logging quickly and efficiently, troubleshooting, and setup of a portable station. Just as it would be great to have more club members active on Field Day, it would be great to have more members activating POTA parks.

Here are two challenges that I will present club members with:

1. **Make a commitment to Field Day.** Mark June 26 and 27 on your calendar now. Think about how you've been involved in the past and how you might be involved in 2027. There is no need to move outside your comfort zone. If your goal is to observe, that's participation. But if you have the time available, the inclination, and the ambition, there are enough months before June to upgrade your license, learn Morse Code, and make 100 POTA activations. Maybe your situation puts you somewhere between those extremes.
2. **Get more involved with POTA.** POTA allows you to operate just about any mode and any band, at any power level, on any day and from one of a dozen local parks. And, you don't need to buy any equipment to get started. MARC has no shortage of 'Elmers' who will meet you in a park, bring all the equipment, and help you get started.

If I haven't convinced you about the benefits of POTA, speak with **Andy, N1XXU**, **Debbie, K1PET**, **Scott, W1HLP**, **Jim, KC1TSG**, **Bill, NR1B**, **Jules, KC1STF**, **Don, W1BRY**, **Paul, WA1MAC**, or **Andy, AC1TY**. They all get out to a park regularly and have made thousands or tens of thousands of QSOs.

There must be something to it.

Discussion/Meeting Results

1. **Call to Order:** The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. EDT by NZ1J, President Dave Tipping.
2. **Secretary's Report:** The secretary's report was delivered by KC1STF, Jules LoRusso. July 2026 Business meeting minutes were approved by membership.
 - Three new members for August 2026 (welcome Bryan, John and Tom):
 - Bryan Wyson KC1ZYS
 - John Mayo KC1ZZT
 - Thomas O'Hare N1SIA
 - Membership voted to approve June 2026 business meeting minutes.
 - No new members for July 2026
 - No Correspondence for August 2026
3. **Treasurer's Report:** The Treasurer's report was created by AC1SK, George Bucci (see report) and published in email by Dave Tipping on 08/11/26 prior to the meeting.
 - MOTION TO APPROVE the report was approved by membership.
 - Question was raised on budget for Scholarship committee by interest from one of the Vanguard funds.
Members agreed the present \$2000/yr should remain as the club policy. The scholarship fund also receives donations from the Nutmeg Hamfest.
 - Rick KC1OYN clarified that Nutmeg Hamfest donation was to be used for purpose of scholarship. Other Vanguard funds can be used for any purpose per membership vote.
 - Post office form letter confirmed irrelevant; payment due by end of year – no issue.

4. **Station Manager's Report** - The station manager's report was delivered by K1RCT Rob Cichon (see report) and published in email by Dave Tipping prior to the meeting. Some details that were discussed are below:
 - o Tennadyne parts for the log periodic antenna installed by John K1LYP using a bucket truck; additional hardware (\$68) purchased. Work is almost complete.
 - o Mike Ash K1LHO raised issue that SKCC logging software is incompatible with the station's Windows 7 PCs. Rob will load software on club's Windows 10/11 laptops to use until the new Windows 11 station PCs have been installed.
5. **Repeater Committee Report** - Presented by Mike Ash, K1LHO
 - o Repeater antenna installation delayed awaiting Joe Murray N1LES return from vacation. Climber documentation was submitted to Town of Wallingford on method for hauling antenna without scratching newly painted tower.
 - o Repeater parts here waiting for climber; Repeater functioning w/o issues, but repairs still planned.
6. **Scholarship Committee Report** - Jim Savage N1ZN
 - o No report for August 2026.

New Business:

1. **SKCC club call sign for WES Weekend Event**
 - SKCC club call (W1NRG) authorized for use by Mike (K1LHO) during the September WES weekend event.
2. **Facebook page Administration Issues**
 - o Prior to 8/13/26 there were 10 MARC Facebook administrators with equal privileges.
 - o The Facebook page resided on Steve Allen's (KC1SA) personal account for about 11 years with multiple administrators.
 - o Dave NZ1J discussed w/Steve Allen, and Steve was willing to release the Facebook pages from his personal account.
 - o Officers now control the Facebook accounts as noted below:
 - Facebook page: Bill, Dave
 - Facebook group: Bill, Dave, Jimmy
 - o There was discussion on how administrators were selected.
 - Rick K10YN - why not all officers?
 - Eric K1JBL - it's not an official organ of the club, should be no issue with administrator plan.
 - Jules KC1STF - No issue as an officer not being an administrator
 - o Club agreed the new operating model for Facebook administrators was acceptable to move forward, and an improvement.
3. **LARC at the MARC Summer Picnic Event**
 - o It's a club tradition a summer picnic event is held for MARC members and guests. Originally the picnic was in a park but over the past 5 years, the event was held at the OEM to simplify the logistics for the organizers and also to have the facilities at the OEM to be available during the event.
 - o The summer picnic will be held at the OEM on September 19th at noon.
 - o Picnic budget for food and snacks set at \$200;
 - Club will cover hot dogs, hamburgers, ~85% lean burgers, chips, potato salad, desserts, drinks.
4. **QSL card fees for DX contacts**
 - o Background: Some stations in the world require a fee for QSL cards for validation of a DX contact. Some are turning this into a money making operation. Scott W1HLP worked a station in the Congo who required a \$10 donation.
 - o Al N1API recommended issuing a complaint to the individual station operator.
 - o Scott W1HLP to share QST editorial on QSL card fees electronically with Dave for club-wide distribution.
 - o For QSL card fee practices, consensus reached that fees up to ~\$3 are reasonable; \$7-\$10 considered excessive.
5. **Adjournment**
 - o Meeting was adjourned at ~7:55 PM.

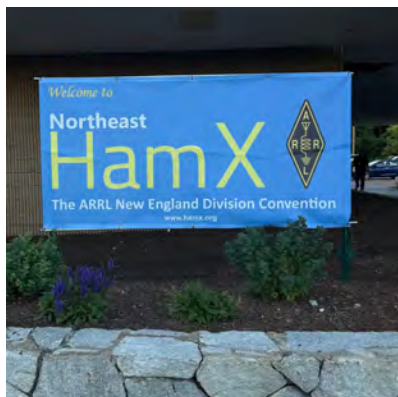

Recapping HamX 2026...

This year's Northeast HamXposition and ARRL New England Division Conference took place from August 13-16, 2026 at the Best Western Royal Plaza Hotel & Trade Center in Marlborough, MA. This year's event saw picture-perfect weather for all four days and featured a record number of presentations and workshops. Six members of the Meriden Amateur Radio Club, including yours truly, **Jimmy, AB1DQ**, shared their time and expertise, giving presentations to the attendees at HamX this year.

I have been regularly attending the Northeast HamXposition since I was first licensed in 2002, back when it was a bi-annual event held in Boxboro. I remember purchasing my first HF rig, a thrifty Icom IC-718 on my first trip to Boxboro.

What stood out for me this year was the picture perfect weather, the time I spent missing connecting with old friends and meeting some new folks and gathering new ideas for projects to take on in my year ahead in the hobby, including setting up a digital internet radio hotspot, upping my Morse Code skills, and several HF antenna ideas to consider - including the T2LT (Tuned Transmission Line Trap) for 10 meter, a new concept to me.

MARC member **David KC1PEN** led a FoxHunt at HamX and shared the following impressions of the conference...

"I recently attended the Northeast HamXposition 2026, the largest hamfest in the Northeastern US with the highest quantities of forums/ presentations. This happened to be a special trip, not only because my dad, a fellow ham, and over a half dozen friends from my club were there, but because this was my first time attending as a presenter.

"My talk was one of 3 related to foxhunting, and focused on foxhunting on a budget as a springboard to grow club activity. NC7R, Charles Nelson of South Windsor, presented a basic primer on the tools and techniques for foxhunting, and W1MJ, Elliot Mayer of Belmont, MA, led a live demo leading a group to find 4 foxes that were hidden on the event property, 2 of which I placed.

"During our talks, we demonstrated some of the best aspects of Ham radio: the knowledge sharing and camaraderie. Each of us presenters helped the other to fill in the blanks, expand in areas where we might know more, etc.

"Some of the other talks I attended were great, particularly one about a teacher who's brought Ham to the classroom, leading to a large number of young licensed operators, the formation of a school club, and incorporation of Ham into much of how the school's STEM clubs function.

Ellen, KC1TSM, always enjoys attending the YLRL (The Young Ladies Radio League) sessions at the HamXposition and shares the following takeaways...

"The YLRL held two events at HamX 2026 in Marlboro - an informal get-together and an information-packed forum.

"It reminded me what an extraordinarily friendly and supportive group YLRL is. I attended my first YLRL session a few years before I became a ham. You will generally meet a few spouses or daughters interested in learning more about the hobby, and this group is bursting with enthusiasm, anxious to mentor new hams and to recruit women exploring the hobby. After I passed my Technician exam and had the chance to celebrate with my OM, Jimmy AB1DQ, I couldn't wait to announce it at this gathering a few years ago, and I am still grateful for their cheers.

"YLS often find themselves the only woman in the room at their local clubs so it is a wonderful opportunity to be surrounded by YLS. This year I was particularly excited to see younger YLS turning out in bigger numbers,

"We learned that Marlborough will be the site of the 2027 YLRL Convention (August 26 - 29, 2027) in conjunction with the ARRL New England Division Convention. More info will be available soon. In the meantime, please check out YLRL's website for information and upcoming events.

Jimmy, AB1DQ, brought the Technician Forum, initiated at Nutfest last year, to the larger stage of HamX this year, presenting a slate of five workshops on Friday along with HamX Program Chair Mark Noe KE1IU and Rhode Island CW aficionado Rob Jackson, N1WRJ. The overall theme of the five-hour Friday workshops was to inspire and promote great things any ham can do with a Technician Class license without needing to upgrade to General. (Jimmy cringes whenever he hears anyone say, "I'm only a Tech..." ARRRRGH!!!) The sessions were well attended on Friday, and Jimmy, Mark, and Rob presented a mini-forum on Sunday morning, repeating the three most popular sessions from Friday.

Assessing the overall HamX 2026 experience, Jimmy felt this year was one of the finest ARRL New England Conferences he's ever attended...

"I always enjoy presenting at HamX because it gives me great joy in sharing my favorite aspects of the radio hobby with the hope of inspiring new members of our community. But even more so, I always find myself learning from the others in my sessions. This year was no exception.

"The 10-meters for the Technician forum prompted a spirited debate first on Friday on whether or not a basic 10M dipole antenna should include a balun - the prevailing opinion was that it absolutely should be incorporated. But when the question was rehashed on Sunday morning, the group went the other way, concluding there is no good reason to include the choke until stray RF is noted.

"Again, I came away inspired to try new areas of the hobby, and I had my co-presenters to thank. Mark's talk on digital FM modes has launched me on exploring Yaesu's C4SM System Fusion platform and Rob's passionate advocacy for Morse Code has given me resolve to improve my copying skills using several of the resources he shared."

Once again this year, Nutmeg Hamfest Alliance President, **Dr. Ed Snyder, W1YSM**, gave an update on the growth of his brainchild (what else?), the MARCONI program as part of the HamX "Club Track," a series of eight short presentations held on Friday that are aimed at fostering the growth of local amateur radio clubs. According to Dr. Snyder,

"The new MARCONI is now managed as a program of the ARRL Field Services Office and will provide an ongoing series of grants to Higher Activity Clubs (HACs), in support of their attempts to resuscitate Low Activity Clubs (LACs). Several MARCONI grants are slated to be awarded before the end of this year.

"The audience was composed of about 20 ham club members from across New England.

A Two Day POTA Rove

POTA activators know that the driving distance to new parks keeps increasing as one activates more parks. The first five or ten parks are relatively close by. However, after a year or two of activating parks, getting to a new park means an hour or more drive. Often, it's best to locate a cluster of parks and make the long drive to activate three, four, or five parks.

On August 24 and 25, I tried something different. I set out on a 350-mile route to make twelve park activations in two days. For this adventure, I also wanted to camp overnight. It turned out to be a really nice trip.

I don't think my luck could have been better. The weather was perfect. I had no trouble making QSOs. Massasoit State Park Campground is a great place to camp and is a POTA park. Scott, W1HLP, and Jim, N1ZN, had no trouble working me on 40 meters. I made QSOs on POTA's 'early shift' and some more on 'late shift.' And, I visited some very nice parks.

At US-2430, Dighton Rock State Park, I ran into N1ZAG and N1NTM, who were also there to do an activation. We had a nice talk and they're both in my log.

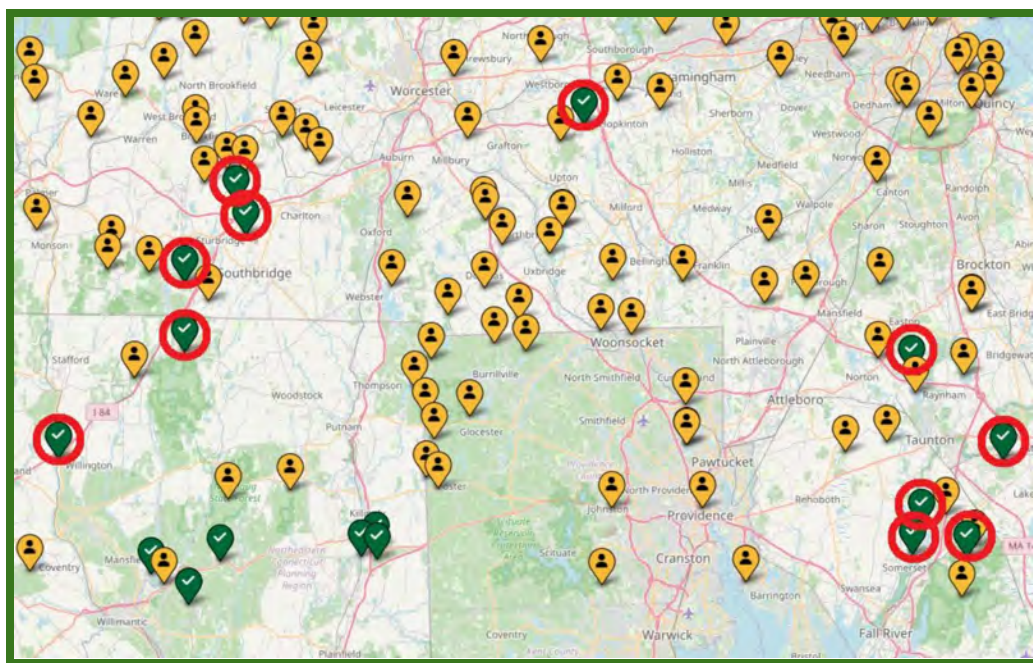
At the Massasoit campground, I was able to activate at 7 pm on one UTC day and again at 8 pm on another UTC day. A few LED lights made the evening activation easy. Using CW and headphones, I operated in my campsite and didn't disturb my neighbors.

Overall, this was the equivalent of two 175-mile day trips. Those would be the kind of trips that could include Danielson, CT or part of Rhode Island. By making the days consecutive, I was able to cover a lot of ground in Massachusetts and to pick and choose which parks to activate.

In the end, I activated eleven parks and completed two 'Warthogs' (five parks in one day). I activated Massasoit on both days. The camping and the late shift activations were part of the fun. I made 180 QSOs and 22 park-to-park contacts. I also worked quite a few new-to-me stations, which helped earn some QRZ 250 endorsements.

This was also a bit of a trial run. I got to see how my senior citizen body dealt with sleeping on the ground. I determined that the radio equipment and the camping equipment do all fit in my car. I lasted two days without running out of battery power. Though there wouldn't

be much point in me retracing this route, I enjoyed the trip and will likely try another two-day rove.

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QRP Guys Shuts Down

QRPGuys, the popular website for QRP kits and essential accessories, went dark in August. In recent years, it wasn't uncommon for QRPGuys to temporarily shut down when health concerns required the owners to take some time off, and for the past few years, the website would be suspended during summer months only to reopen in the fall.

But this time the shutdown appears to be permanent. QRP Guys principal and legendary QRP designer, Doug Hendricks, KI6DS, posted the following announcement on the QRPGuys website on August 1:

*"Jim Cates, WA6GER, sk. once told me when something has run its course you will know when it is time to close. Jim Cates was a very smart man. It is time for QRPGuys to close. I am tired, my health isn't what it once was, and it's time for me to step down and close the company.
I will still be active in Qrp, especially with CalQrp.Groups.io. But my time running a Qrp business is over, effective immediately. I would like to thank all of our customers, my long time partner, Ken LoCasale (who put up with me all of these years), and my family. Thank you.
I hope to see you soon.

QRP aficionados are well familiar with Doug's place within the hobby. First licensed as WB0YVK in 1976, Doug first became interested in QRP in 1976, but was discouraged by the other hams in the area. He moved with his wife Joanne and daughters Robbie and Cassie to California in 1985. He met Jim Cates, WA6GER, in 1987 and they became close friends. In 1993, they founded the NorCal QRP Club, which became renowned for the kits that they produced - over 20,000 kits over the years.

The QRP Guys was an affiliation of several notable QRP developers including, in addition to KI6DS, Ken Locasale, WA4MNT; Steve Weber, KD1JV; Kazu Terasaki, AG6NS; Yin Shih, N9YS; Dan Dayloe, N7VE; John Stevens, K5JS, and Cliff Donley, K8TND.

Some good news, Ken, WA4MNT has launched a new site that echoes the original QRP Guys at www.qrpbuilder.com. Currently, Ken's QRP Builder site offers several QRP paddle kits, antennas, and accessories, and a couple of receiver kits. A History of The Meriden Amateur Radio Club, the Early Years

The majority of this article is derived from my personal experiences with the MARC starting from about 1962 when I was first licensed as KN1WJL, a Novice Class licensee at the age of 16 and joining the club at the same time. Now approaching 80, my personal recollections of this time period seem to be clearer and more distinct than why I just walked into the bathroom and forgot why?? My part of the article deals with the early 1940's through the 1970's. Most of the research on old newspaper articles is courtesy of Rich WA1TRY, who has a real knack for internet searches and, of course, is our club historian and has a treasure trove of the club documents.

As I traveled on my path towards a career in teaching in the State Vo-tech System, my time with ham radio diminished somewhat in the 80's & beyond, but fortunately Rich WA1TRY picked up the slack and literally became "Mr. Meriden Amateur Radio Club," deeply involving himself in all aspects of the club.

The Ole-Timers of the club keep changing, not necessarily voluntarily either; K1WJL is the most senior (member-wise) followed by Mike K1LHO, John K1VDF, Al N1API, Rich WA1TRY, John WA1JKR, Jerry K1TGX, not necessarily in that order, due to memory gaps...The only true anomaly is Al N1API, who technically is the oldest, as he did come to the Dossin Beach MARC facilities with his father Vic W1JAX as a young junior op in the late 1950's. Al went into the service and did not get his ham license and join the MARC until later in the 1970's.

Rich did a deep dive into newspaper archives and came out with quite a few gems, the first being the earliest mention of a "Meriden Radio Club" being organized for all radio enthusiasts who can copy & send Morse code, in April of 1921 at the Conn. Telephone & Electric building. (See Ref#1) A listing of the proposed constitution included meetings on the 1st & 3rd Thursdays (the first being the business meeting) and was so eerily similar to our present-day document.

About 60 persons were present at the meeting of radio enthusiasts last evening in the assembly hall of the research laboratory of the Connecticut Telephone & Electric company. This was the second meeting held to form a Meriden Radio club, and the committee appointed last week reported a tentative draft of a constitution for the new organization.

This proposed constitution was read and discussion invited upon each of the articles. Some slight changes were made and the constitution was tabled until the next meeting when a vote will be taken upon its adoption. The committee also reported its nominations of officers for the club as follows: President, A. S. Boynton; vice-president, George Donnelly, and secretary-treasurer, Frank Young. This report was also tabled until the next meeting.

Proposed Constitution.

The proposed constitution has nine articles. The first provides that the name of the organization shall be the Meriden Radio club, and its object the bringing together of the amateurs of Meriden and vicinity who, being interested in the advancement of radio telegraph and telephone, desire to become familiar with the radio art.

Article 2 provides for three classes of membership. Full members shall be over 16 years old, must have been actively connected with radio work for a full year and must be able to receive messages in continental code at the speed of ten words a minute, or be proficient in some other branch of the art. Associate members must be over 16 years of age, but need not be familiar with any branch of radio work if they are interested and desire to join the club. Junior members are those between the ages of 12 and 16 who show an interest in the art

and desire to become proficient in the code and familiarize themselves with radio apparatus.

Entrance Fee and Dues.

Article 3 provides for the fees and dues. Entrance fee for full and associate members is \$1 and for junior members, 50 cents. The annual dues for full and associate members is the sum of \$10 and for junior members \$3. Article 4 provides for the annual election of officers and specifies that only full members may hold office in the club.

Article 5 is given up to the details of the management of the club by the board of directors, which consists of the officers and chairmen of standing committees, numbering five. This article provides for four standing committees as follows: Library and publicity committee, program committee, electrical committee and nominating committee.

Article 6 fixes the time for the annual meeting of the club for the first Thursday in May each year. In Article 7 there is a provision for regular meetings of the club on the first and third Thursday of each month, the meeting on the first being the monthly business meeting. In Article 8 it is provided that three of the five directors shall be a quorum for the transaction of business by the board of directors, and in meetings of the club one-third of the entire membership shall constitute a quorum.

The final article provides for amendments to the constitution, there being a provision that they must be proposed at least a month before they are acted upon, and require a two-thirds vote of the entire membership.

At the conclusion of the meeting 46 of those present signed their names as intending to join the new club. — Announcement was made that the next meeting will be held in the same place at 8 o'clock next Thursday evening. This meeting will be open to all who are interested, and those who desire to join the club will be given a chance to do so at that time.

Not much was documented of this group, and it was in the fall of 1941 that ham radio operators from Meriden formed the U.H.F. Amateur Emergency Association (see Ref#2), whose function was to monitor aircraft and warn the proper authorities (Civil Defense).

In Jan. 1942, the name was changed to the Hanging Hills Radio Club; Frank W1FYG was elected Secretary (see Ref #3). All normal amateur radio operations were suspended between 1942 and 1946, also due to the fact that hams who were proficient in Morse code were vital in the military war effort and were pressed into service. The club still managed to survive the loss of on-air time and re-emerged in 1947.

In Feb of 1947, the MARC elected Frank Darmofalsaki W1FYG President, Howard Wessenberg W1HVF activities manager, Ed Bischert W1NRG Treasurer, and Herb Ellmers W1QPD Secretary. Heywood Waytts W1RCI replaced Mr. Wessenberg when he relocated to Newington later in the year.

Radio "Hams" Form Association Here

Officers were elected of the U. H. F. Amateur Emergency association, composed of radio "hams" affiliated with the Aircraft Warning Service at a meeting last night in the state armory. The officers are:

President—John Bibisi, of Middletown, operator of Station W-1KJT
Secretary—Frank Darmofalaski, of Meriden, operator of Station W-1FV-PVG.

Activity of the association will be the formation of a relay league composed of amateurs in Meriden and vicinity with the purpose of co-operating with the Aircraft Warning service.

The association is raising funds to purchase radio equipment for use in connection with the public service.

Local Radio Club Changes Its Name

Notice to the public is being made by the former U. H. F. amateur emergency Association. That a change of name was adopted by the club's membership at a regular meeting held on Monday evening.

The club now holds regular Monday evening meetings at the residence of Louis Jacob, 188 Camp Street, amateur operator of WIGLK.

Hereafter the club will be known as The Hanging Hills Radio Club.

The officers of the club are John Bibisi, president; Frank Darmofalaski, secretary; and George Staski, treasurer.

They conducted meetings in various locations, from members' homes, the Ritz Hotel, and the YMCA building, when a committee was formed to find a permanent home. They approached Meriden Mayor Howard Houston for assistance and within a few months the MARC was given the use of the abandoned Dossin Beach bath house at Hanover Pond in So. Meriden. A newspaper article from Dec 1948 details the Open House ceremonies with invited city dignitaries. (See ref#4, below.

The club photograph that appears at the top of this article was taken right around this time and was probably located at the double door entrance to the radio room at Dossin Beach. (Editor's note: the Meriden Lions Club (K1WJL member) did extensive renovations of the location for the QRWA offices & showroom).

This group shot is indicative of the era of stiff, starched business attire, which is somewhat hilarious when you see the staged pictures for the newspaper of a 1950's Fox Hunt with shirts, ties, and jackets.

The MARC was active & thriving through the late 1950's at Dossin Beach when, rumor has it, the City who "giveth" shall also "taketh" and replaced us with a dog pound. The MARC went silent for several years until about 1960/61 when they resumed meetings at the Columbus Hall on Springdale Ave. and have been going strong ever since.

They ping-ponged across the city from the second floor of a downtown bank, the second floor of the Red Cross building on Colony St., ARC Handicapped facility on Cook Ave., the PLAV building on East Main St, the Police Benevolent Society (who were really not all that benevolent), and the International Corporate Headquarters of ComStat in Wallingford (WA1TRY et al.

Meriden Amateur Radio Club Plans Public Inspection

Officials Invited To Visit Quarters At Dossin Beach

The Meriden Amateur Radio Club has invited city officials, communications people and the press to inspect the Dossin Beach headquarters, 7:30 o'clock, Thursday evening.

At last night's regular club meeting, it was announced invitations have gone out to Mayor Houston, Frank Sprafke, chairman of the Recreation Commission, Chief of

Police Michael B. Carroll, Chief Leonard Petrucelli and Captain Charles Zunmer of the Signal Department. Other agencies interested in message handling are being contacted through Mrs. J. B. Crabtree for the Red Cross; T. Val Hedgpeth, Southern New England Telephone Co.; Stanley Killeen, Connecticut Light and Power Co., and Ernest Markham for aviation.

All city officials and persons representing agencies interested in communication will be welcomed Thursday evening. The club voted last night to open next Sunday's meeting to members' families and the public. Meetings begin at 7:30 and are ordinarily preceded by a half hour of code practice for prospective amateurs.

At the open house Thursday for officials, the club plans to initiate a message from Mayor Houston to Red Cross headquarters in Hartford, transmitting from the club's 10-meter station at Dossin Beach through WIAW, Headquarters Station of the American Radio Relay League to its destination. Officials will have the opportunity to see how the former north-wing bathhouse has been transformed into a message center and meeting place for the 29 members.

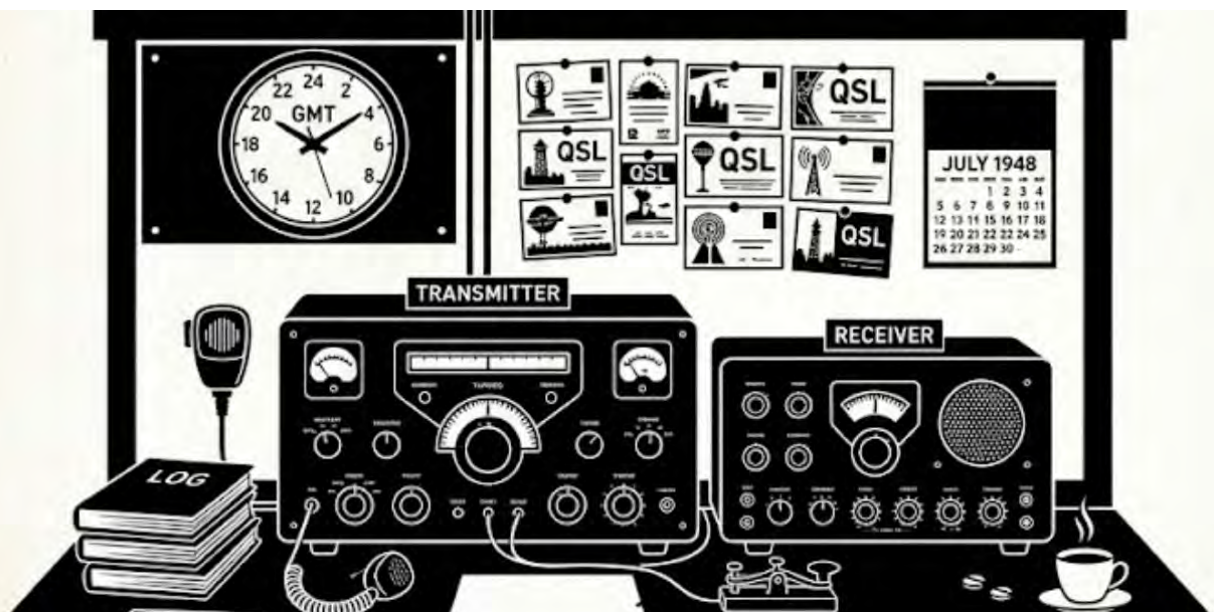
A committee headed by Lawrence Cook, and including Floyd Steiner, Emil Grieco and Stewart Stockwell, has been active since the room was made available by the city. They have stacked bathhouse racks behind partitions and fashioned a meeting hall and transmitter room in cream and brown paint. They have laid a wood floor over the concrete, painting it grey and insalled two stoves,

After the business portion of last night's meeting, Emanuel Rame showed three reels of sound movies, and coffee and doughnuts have become a social feature of each regular meeting.

The Meriden Amateur Radio Club was organized in February at the Y.M.C.A. It met Sunday evenings there and later at the Rita Restaurant. Through interested city officials the present permanent quarters were made available. The club has a constitution and has preped on its bulletin board official recognition from the ARRL. Several social events were hold in the summer and fall, including a picnic at Lake Quonnopaug.

The original slate of officers elected by 12 charter members in February was Frank Darmofalski, WIPYG, president; Howard Wessenberg, WIHVF, activities manager; Edward Bischert, WINRG, treasurer, and Herbert Elimers, WIQPD, secretary. Heyward Waits, WIRCI, replaced Mr. Wessenberg, af vice president when WIHVF moved to Newington.

The More You Know...

Verticals, Radials, and Magic Carpets

If you have limited space for an antenna, operating on the HF bands can present a challenge. That's why vertical antennas are attractive to so many amateurs.

To radiate with reasonable efficiency, however, vertical antenna systems require ground returns for RF currents. These ground returns are typically provided by radial wires attached to feed line ground connections at the bases of the antennas. Radial wires, along with the vertical portions of the antennas themselves, can be elevated above ground. Electrically speaking, elevated radials make the antenna behave somewhat like a dipole with one leg vertical and the other horizontal. This configuration can offer good performance, but you need sufficient horizontal room to make it work.

The alternative, and the most common configuration by far, is a network of on-ground radials. You simply put the radial wires directly on the soil, or beneath it. Unlike elevated radials, you don't have to trim on-ground radial wires to achieve acceptable SWRs.

But how many on-ground radial wires do you need and how long must they be? The traditional advice was to put down as many wires as possible, as long as possible. But in 2009 Rudy Severns, N6LF, published an article in ARRL's QEX magazine that described the extensive research he had performed to answer this question once and for all.

Rudy conducted a series of meticulous tests and found that it was possible to achieve an acceptable 0 dBd gain figure (gain relative to a dipole in free space) with just 16 radials, each only $\frac{1}{4}$ wavelength long at the lowest operating frequency. For a 20-meter vertical, for example, each of those wires would be about 17 feet in length.

Adding even more radials will improve performance to a certain degree, but you arrive at a point of diminishing returns rather quickly. In my conversations with Rudy, he stated that for the average amateur station, 16 quarter-wavelength radials would usually suffice. He felt that the additional 2-dBd gain you might achieve by adding substantially more radials (as many as 50 total) would not be worth the effort for most applications.

And Then There are Magic Carpets

At the opposite extreme, Rudy found that with only four wires on the ground, of almost any length, the relative gain drops from zero to about -1 dBd. As he pointed out, that's obviously heading in the wrong direction, gain-wise, but it is still adequate for making contacts, especially if you can compensate with higher power levels. I've had successful Parks On The Air (POTA) activations using my portable vertical and only 5 radial wires.

But a ground return doesn't have to be comprised of wires – any conductive surface beneath the antenna will do if it is connected to the feed line ground. This is where so-called "magic carpets" come into play. Also known as "Faraday cloths," they often consist of large pieces of fabric that contain steel, aluminum, or copper threads. They can also be made entirely of these materials (window screens come to mind).

Whatever you wish to call them, these carpets are popular with POTA operators because (1) they are extremely easy to deploy, (2) they are relatively compact, and (3) they present minimal trip hazards.

But how do they compare to $\frac{1}{4}$ -wavelength wire radials in terms of performance?

I conducted my own test on 20 meters using a 4 x 10-foot steel screen and five ¼-wavelength radials. With my transceiver output set at 5 W and the radials deployed around the antenna, I made a series of FT8 contacts and then checked reception reports on the PSKReporter website. Next, I quickly disconnected the radials and replaced them with the steel screen beneath the antenna. More FT8 contacts followed and the results were compared.

There was no significant difference!

This wasn't a scientifically rigorous test because it failed to take several variables into account. Still, it was an interesting exercise that seemed to confirm Rudy's results.

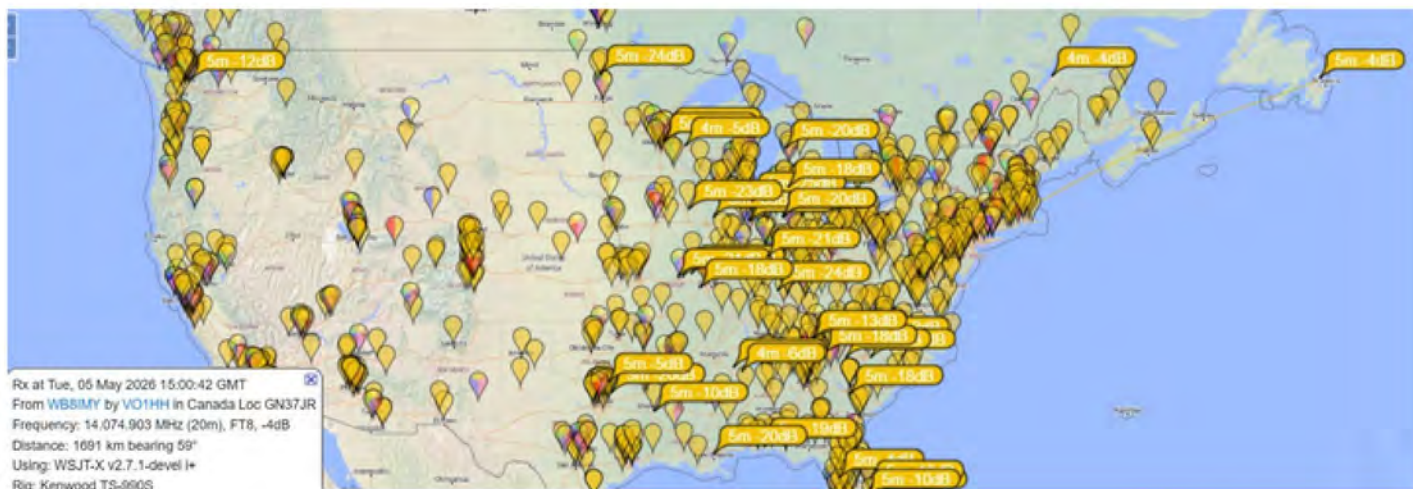
At the end of the day, there is nothing "magical" about magic carpets, but in terms of sheer utility, their POTA popularity is easy to understand. After all, even a sub-optimal RF ground return is better than none at all.

Contest activity begins heating up in September, and this offers excellent opportunities to put these ideas to the test – even from portable stations. You have the North American CW Sprint on September 13 and the North American RTTY Sprint on September 20. These are exciting competitions with challenging "QSY rules." Review of the Pebble HF QRP Kit

On a dreary Monday afternoon way back in February, as my workday was winding down, I fired up the FT-891 on my desk to do a little POTA hunting.

I copied N4BKY calling CQ POTA on 20 M CW from US-1043 in Alabama and answered her call. We swapped signal reports, and after our otherwise mundane POTA QSO, I discovered that N4BKY, Becky, along with her husband, Michael, N4FFF, were ham radio content providers on YouTube. Their channel is [@HamRadioDuo](#), and they regularly post videos of their QRP POTA activations demonstrating how easy it is to work QRP CW from the parks.

Becky contacted me to tell me they were considering including our QSO in an upcoming video and she also told me about a new simple QRP kit - the Pebble HF - that they were developing and hoping to launch this summer.

As a lifelong kit-builder, I let her know I'd be eager to put together my own Pebble, and I put my name on the pre-launch waiting list. As the late great Tom Petty sang, "the waiting is the hardest part," but it wasn't insufferable - my Pebble finally arrived on July 30.

The Pebble HF is an affordable compact HF radio kit for anyone to get into HF amateur radio and was created to get more people into the hobby, to encourage people to upgrade their license and to have fun with HF, or put more simply - to encourage more people to have fun with outdoor radio!

The kit was developed in collaboration with Barb Asuroglu, WB2CBA. The hardware design is based on Barb's work, and the firmware was written by Guido, PE1NNZ.

Selected specs of the Pebble:

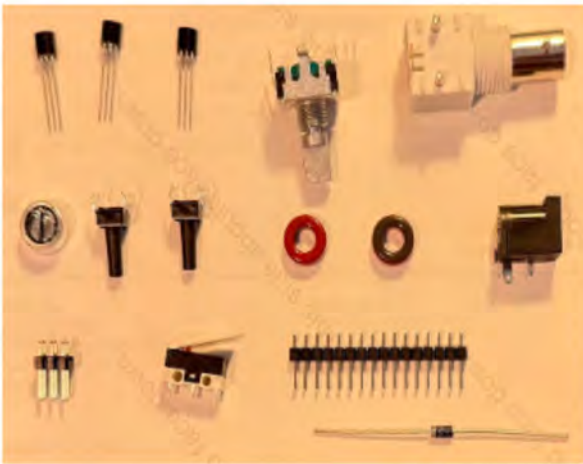
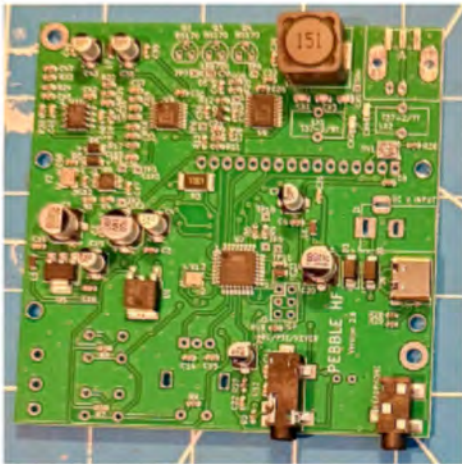

- Up to 5W output (7-14V input) or 1W on USB-C (5V)
- CW modes: straight key and iambic, configurable tone frequency, separate sidetone and main volume controls
- DSP filters: full open, 2500, 1700, 500, 200, 100, and 50 Hz
- VOX (auto transmit for digital modes)
- AGC and noise reduction
- Open hardware + firmware
- Weighs less than 4.7oz (132g)
- Power consumption: ~80mA RX, 500-600mA TX @ 12V

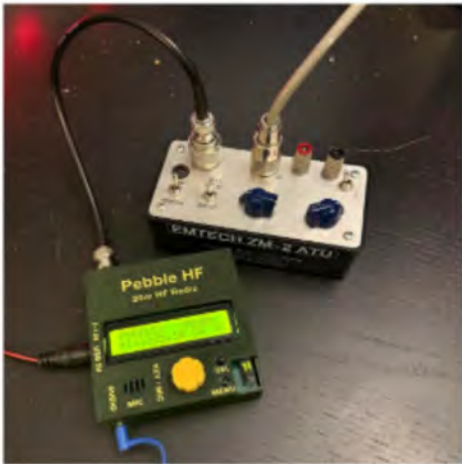
The Pebble positions itself as (1) Ultra-affordable, (2) Easy to build, (3) Performing well on the air in POTA and other portable situations. How did it do? Here's my take...

Ultra-affordable? For sure! The kit is priced at under \$50, and comes complete with a quality PCB, all components, and an attractive 3D-printed case, complete with built-in microphone and mini-CW key/PTT button.

Easy to build? Definitely! This is a feature-packed SDR microcontroller-based rig, but all of the many SMC components come pre-soldered to the board. This leaves the builder to wind a few toroids and solder on a handful of through-hole components. Mine went together in well under an hour and a half, working carefully and methodically. An online YouTube assembly video may help first-time kit builders.

September is SKCC Canadian Straight Key Month



September is Canadian Straight Key Month and a great opportunity for stations from around the World to work CSKM stations for awards and fun. CSKM is simple and straightforward. CSKM has no special call sign for CSKM stations. CSKM operators just need to use their own call signs, send the usual SKCC QSO exchange, and add "CSKM" after their names. For example:

CQ SKM de VA3FRL

W7VC de VA3FRL ur 599 ON RICK/CSKM 24441S



Additionally, participating CSKM stations do not need to sign up for time slots. Any SKCC member operating in Canada can operate CSKM at any time they wish, for as long as they wish, and on any band. It's entirely possible that you'll hear more than one CSKM station operating at the same time from the same Canadian Province.

SKCC asks that any Canadian operator give the CSKM coordinators as much advance notice of date and time of operating as possible so we can put it on the CSKM calendar and give other Worldwide hams who want to work you a heads up.

Further, SKCC also asks that CSKM stations post their call and frequency on the sked page. And we also ask that CSKM stations email their session logs in ADIF format so they can upload it to our Stats page which also confirms QSOs.

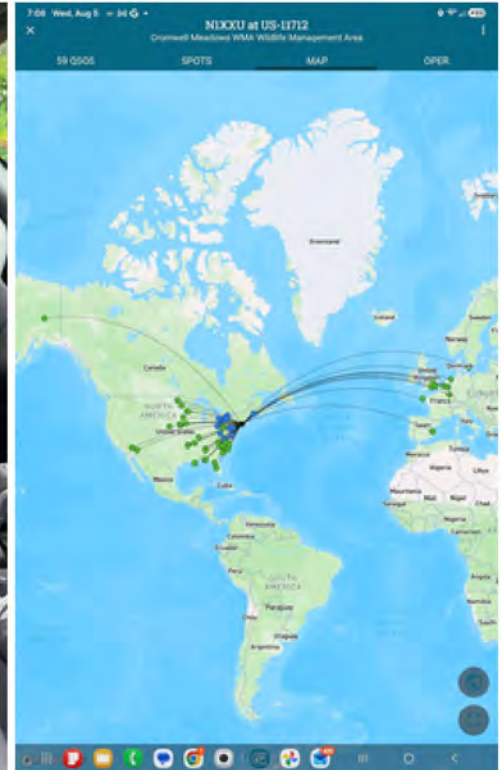

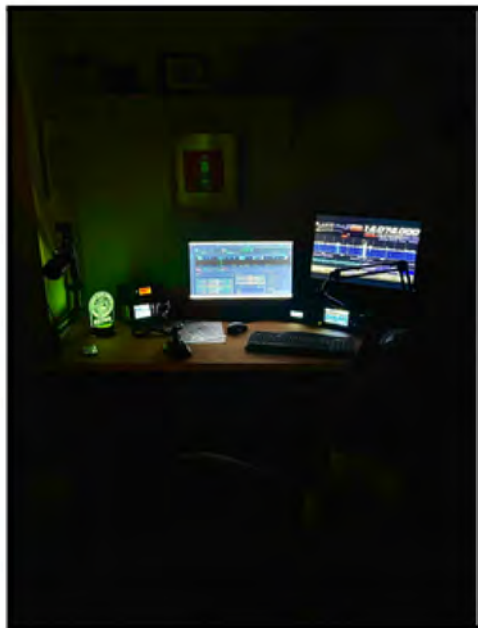
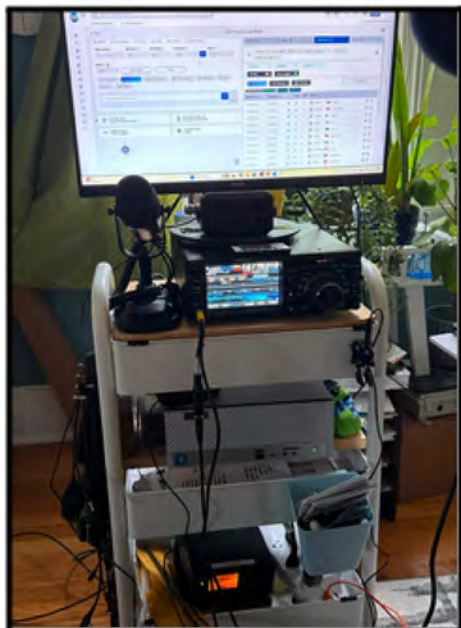
